Before my departure to Tanzania to visit the school and to see progress on the classrooms and the computer lab, Joshua's sponsor asked me if I could meet him and just get more information about him and his family. In his young life, this little boy has had to endure a lot already. Shortly after he was born his father passed away. He's an only child. After his father's passing, his mom struggled to care for him and after a while she no longer could, so she moved in with her in-laws. Over time she just couldn't cope with the loss of her husband. She developed mental problems and became incapable of caring for Joshua. His grandparents took care of him until they no longer could. Then his great aunt, who lives in Sakila, took him in last year and he has been living with them ever since. He was registered at Sluys/Anderson Primary School in June 2008 and started school this January. "He's doing well", says his great-aunt, "...and he loves going to school where he can play with kids his own age. When he



comes home in the afternoon, he seems like a different child. His often sad face looks brighter."

We never tire of hearing these reports about the good being accomplished by your faithful giving. A Port Gamble couple sponsored Joshua for a whole year as a birthday gift to their mother. How thoughtful and practical of them. These are REAL children who are in REAL need. And YOU are meeting that need.
